THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK. WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, Sept. 28th—Cattle—Full seasonable supply of beef, which included a large proportion of prime heifers and cow heifers; usual attendance of buyers. Trade in this section not as brisk as last Wednesday, and consequently rates were somewhat easier, supply being more than demand; prime handy weighted heifers were in best demand at slightly reduced rates. In fat cow section trade was brisk for outstanding lots, but for others quieter; clearance in this section not effected. Forward and heavy bullocks were bid for, but in most cases vendors held for extreme rates, which buyers were not willing to give. Choice drafts of store cattle enquired for and cashed at current values. Young stores, both heifers and bullocks, met an easier trade; demand not quite as active, but where sales effected, rates about maintained. Fair clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £40 to £45 10s.; second run, £33 to £37 10s.; small, £25 to £31. Fat cows, best, £44 10s. to £45 10s.; second run, £32 10s. to £36; others, £26 to £29. Old, £15 to £20. Two and a half year old store bullocks, £35 to £38; second run, £28 10s. to £31. One and a half year olds, best, £26 15s. to £28 10s.; second run, £19 to £25. Calves, small, £9 15s.

Sheep—Numbers on offer about the same as last Wednesday; the entry included a good proportion of prime sheep; trade, however, was quiet and purchasers endeavoured to purchase at lower rates. Choice hoggets were in most favour, and extra prime pens about held their own, but for others easier rates ruled. Increased entry of ewes, both fat and breeding, which met steady trade. Choice fat lambs also in fair demand. The small entry of store lambs met a dull market. All round trade was weaker than last week; clearance not effected. Fat middle weight, best, 162/6; second run, 140/- to 141/-. Hoggets, best, 162/6 to 173/-; second run, 147/6 to 155/-; small, 135/- to 145/-. Ewes, best, 170/-; second run, 140/- to 147/6. Lambs, best, 112/6 to 130/-; second run, 105/- to 110/-—Wm. B. Pitt and Co., Auctioneers.
