AN UNPAYABLE DEBT.

Fifty eight years ago on Thursday of this week the former passed away at the early age of 45 years. His period of leadership gave Ireland new heart and hope and bequeathed to his country an achievement the value and importance of which are hardly fully appreciated and can scarcely be over-estimated. On the anniversary of his death it is fitting that his wonderful work be recalled, however inadequately, and that some tribute of gratitude, no matter how unequal to his services, be paid to the memory of this truly great fighter in Ireland's cause.
