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Chairman—I propose to bring the
matter before the Board, but I
think it would be advisable to dis-
cuss the question in Committee. I
will take a proposition to that
effect.

Mr. Donnellan then proposed that
the Board go into Committee.

This proposition was then de-
clared passed unanimously.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT.

The Manager (Mr. D. O'Brien), at
the conclusion of the Committee
meeting of the Harbour Board,
issued the following statement to
the Press:—

"The Commissioners are pleased
to note that the Hired Carmen have
not carried out their threat, and the
question of seeking an injunction,

FATAL SEIZURE

LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH

While visiting the home of his
sister, Mrs. G. Henry, Parnell St.,
Limerick, around noon to-day, Mr.
Patrick Gould, aged about 54 years,
had a seizure and passed away in
a short time. His remains were re-
moved to Barrington's Hospital,
where an inquest was deemed not
necessary.

The deceased, who was a native
of the city, was brother of the late
Mr. John Gould, who was employed
for many years in the firm of
Messrs. O'Mara, Limited, Bacon
Curers. He emigrated to the United
States nearly twenty years ago. For
the past three months he had been
on holiday in Limerick with his
wife and daughter, and it was his
intention to return to the U.S.A. on
Thursday next.

Very deep and sincere regret, in
which we share, is felt for the
bereaved widow, daughter, and
other relatives.

The deceased was a member of a
highly-respected Limerick family
and was himself widely and deserv-
edly popular with a large circle of
friends and acquaintances.

GIRL'S DEATH

AFTER HAVING TEETH EXTRACTED

At Abbeyfeale Courthouse on
Friday, Coroner Michael Cussen,
Rathkeale, held an inquest touch-
ing the death of Miss Margaret
Barrett, of Knocknasna, Abbey-
feale, which occurred at Mr.
Rourke's Dentistry on the previous
day, after the extraction of some
teeth, under an anaesthetic.

Inspector J. Butler, G.S., conduc-
ted the inquiry, and Mr. M. J.
Woulfe, solicitor, represented the
parents of deceased.

Mrs. Michael Barrett, mother of
the deceased, stated that her
daughter left her house on Thurs-
day to have some teeth extracted
at Abbeyfeale. She was then in
good health. When she next saw
her at 4 o'clock at Abbeyfeale she
was dead.

Dr. McGrath, State Pathologist,
who had made an autopsy with
Dr. Phil. McCarthy, M.O., stated
that he found deceased had a num-
ber of her teeth extracted. He
found a congenital abnormality of
the thymus and other gland, which
rendered the deceased susceptible
to shock from any exciting cause.
He was removing some of the
other organs for further examina-
tion.

Further inquiry was adjourned to
the 18th of October.

CARS COLLIDE IN FOG

ACCIDENT NEAR LIMERICK

In the early hours of this morning
two motor cars, travelling in
opposite directions, came into a
near head-on collision on the
Limerick-Tipperary road, about six
miles out from the city. The
drivers of both were injured, but
not seriously. The cars were badly
damaged. At the time of the im-

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
