ATTACK ON A GUARD

Mary Walsh, a 24-year-old girl, of no fixed abode, but stated to be a native of Limerick, appealed today in the Dublin Circuit Court against a sentence of three months imprisonment imposed on her recently on a charge of having assaulted Garda O'Sullivan.

The Garda gave evidence that he was assaulted at Ellis Quay by the defendant, who was accompanied by two men. She took his baton from him and threw it into the Liffey.

Michael Brady swore that he saw the defendant taking the Guard's baton and putting it under her coat. He later saw her throwing the baton into the Liffey.

The defendant pleaded for a suspension of the sentence, stating that she was soon to be married in England.

The Judge affirmed the conviction, but made the sentence a suspensory one.
