FATAL ACCIDENT Killed On Way To Creamery

FARMER'S TRAGIC END

WHEN going to the creamery at Granagh yesterday morning, Mr. Michael Lyons, farmer, living at Liskennett, Croom, met his death under tragic circumstances.

A short distance from the creamery the horse shied, the deceased being pitched on to the road, head foremost, rendering him unconscious.

WITNESS OF ACCIDENT.

Mr. John O'Shea, Liskennett, who was also going to the creamery, saw the accident happening. He rushed to the aid of the injured man, who, however, was unable to speak. Mr. Lyons was removed to a nearby house and spiritual and medical aid summoned.

Before death supervened the rites of the Church were administered by Rev. M. Connolly, C.C.

The deceased was aged 58 years. He was unmarried and had two sisters.

An inquest was held to-day by Mr. M. Cussen, solicitor, Coroner for West Limerick, and a jury.

Sergt. M. Clifford conducted the proceedings.

FRACTURE OF SKULL.

Dr. O'Connor, Acting M.O., stated that the deceased had a fracture of the skull. Death was due to cardiac respiratory failure.

John O'Shea stated that he was about thirty yards behind the deceased on the road at the time the accident occurred.

The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony. Sympathy was tendered to the relatives of the deceased.

IN POOL OF BLOOD WAR Man Dead At Foot Of Stairs

A DUBLIN TRAGEDY

A FIFTY year old radio operator, Edward Jones, at home in Swords, Dublin, on leave from the British Merchant Navy, was found lying dead to-day at the foot of a staircase in the Castle Grocery Stores, Swords. Jones was fully dressed and is believed to have died from a fractured skull and a broken neck.

In an upstairs room, Timothy Clarke, 56 year old, owner of the shop, was found lying unconscious on the floor, attired only in his shirt.

Jones, who was staying at Market Street, Swords, while on furlough, is believed to have been dead since Saturday night. Clarke is thought to have been lying on the floor since the same time.

The two men are said to have been great friends. They had been seen frequently together since Jones returned on leave about two weeks ago.

DISCOVERY OF TRAGEDY.

The tragedy was discovered to-day, when Harry Jones, brother of the deceased, becoming worried about his whereabouts, made enquiries. He called at the public-house of Mr. Anthony O'Keeffe, next door to the Castle Grocery Stores. The two went to the stores but found the door locked. They forced the lock and found Jones lying in a pool of blood. In a bedroom upstairs they found Clarke lying face upwards, with his hands over his head and his feet drawn upwards.
