Dies In Abbeyleix Convent

FIFTY YEARS IN RELIGION

IT is with feelings of deep regret I that we announce the death of Mother Mary Borgia O'Brien, which event took place at the Brigidine Convent, Abbeyleix (Laoighis) on Friday last.

The deceased, who was a native of Fanningstown, Co. Limerick, was one of a family that had given four of its members to religion. being sister of Venerable Archdeacon O'Brien, D.D. P.P., Patrickswell; of the late Mother Mary Finbar O'Brien, Loretto Convent, Killarney, and of the late Mother Mary Baptist O'Brien, Brigidine Convent, Abbeyleix.

EDUCATED ON THE CONTINENT.

Entering the Brigidine Novitiate at Tullow in 1899 following a most successful educational career on the Continent, the deceased was appointed to Abbeyleix in 1902, and there spent her entire religious life.

Possessing outstanding teaching capabilities, she won the admiration of both pupils and staff for her keen attention to duty. Of a kindly disposition, she had endeared herself to a host of friends, and the manner in which she attended to the wants of the poorer sections of her pupils had won for her a place in the hearts of all.

Next to her religious duties, her chief concern was in the parish church, and she had carried out the position of parish sacristan in a very capable manner for upwards of thirty years. She had also held the position of Convent Bursar for a long number of years.
