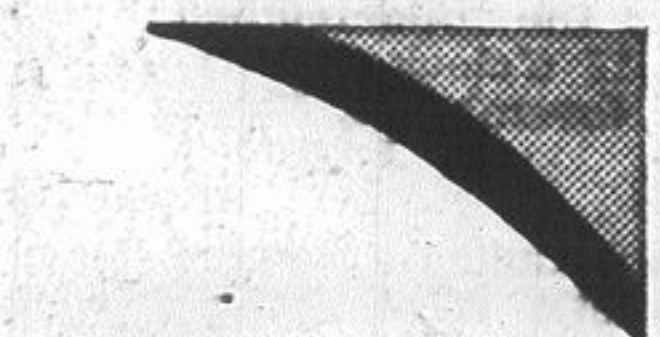

A POPULAR FIGURE
LATE MR. R. J. MURNANE,
M.R.C.V.S.

Newcastle West has lost one of its
 oldest residents and the veterinary
 surgical profession one of its most
 distinguished members by the death
 of Mr. Richard Murnane, M.R.C.V.S.,
 who passed away at his residence in
 Chapel Street early on Monday
 morning (writes our Newcastle
 West correspondent). Although in
 failing health for some time past,
 deceased carried on the practice of
 his profession to the last and
 actually attended cases on Saturday
 shortly before his final illness. Well
 known and extremely popular all
 over the county, the deceased was
 associated with the professional,
 public and private life of Newcastle
 West for half a century. He served
 as veterinary inspector under the
 Limerick County Council in New-
 castle West rural district for over
 fifty years, during which time he
 endeared himself to all classes. He
 will be particularly remembered by
 the farming community to whom, in
 his private as well as professional
 capacity, he was ever a kind and
 generous friend. More popularly
 known throughout West Limerick
 as "Doctor" Murnane, his outstand-
 ing professional skill and advice
 were always available and
 generously given, day or night,
 throughout his remarkably full and
 successful career. Deceased was
 also for many years a very popular
 figure in Irish racing circles, in
 which he was well known and res-
 pected. He was father of Dr. Annie
 Murnane-Power, Caherconlish; of
 Mr. Richard Murnane, Provincial
 Bank, William Street, Limerick; and
 of Mr. John Murnane, Dublin. To
 these as well as to the widow and
 bereaved relatives, sincere sympathy
 will be extended.

CASE FOR FISH AND BOAT
PASS

The Mayor (Mr. G. B. Dillon), at
 the meeting of the City Council on
 Monday night, told Ald. Reidy
 T.D., that the deputation appointed

 tion with the boat pass in the
 Salmon Weir at Thomond Bridge
 had, in fact, discussed the matter
 with Mr. Forde that day. As a re-

 ing inspector of the E.S.B. was to
 come down specially to examine the
 weir.

 by fishermen that a gap for fish in
 the weir was absolutely necessary
