★ WAS LIFE-SIZE.

The monument, needless to say, was not an expression of popular will, but of the ascendancy class. It was a life-size statue, representing Fitzgibbon in the uniform of his regiment. Standing on a granite pedestal eleven feet high, it was very imposing. This inscription was engraven on the base of the plinth: "To commemorate the bravery of Viscount Fitzgibbon, 8th Royal Hussars, and to his gallant companions in arms, natives of the City and County of Limerick, who gloriously fell in the Crimean War, 1855."

★ ON THE AIR.
