WIDER FREEDOM FOR WESTERN GERMAN GOVERNMENT

The three Foreign Ministers of the United States, Great Britain and France agreed in Paris this morning to give a wider measure of freedom to the Federal Government set up in Western Germany.

The matter had been debated for two days before the decision was arrived at to give the Federal Government greater freedom in the conduct of its affairs.

It was stated in Paris this morning that the three Foreign Ministers realised the great responsibility on them to strengthen and achieve peace. The statement added that a lasting peace could only be found by closer co-operation of all peoples of the world.
