

FATHER SUMMONED

THE case of a boy who "insists" on a four-day school week was mentioned at Ennis Court on Friday, when his father was summoned for not sending him regularly to school.

Guard Brennan, who proved the absenteeism, said the boy "takes one day out of every school week no matter what happens."

IRRESPECTIVE OF PARENTS' WISHES.

"Irrespective of the wishes of his parents and the rest of the family?" asked Justice Gordon Hurley.

"Yes," said the Guard.

The boy's mother said he insists on a break in the school days, but, if he gets that, he will go every other day.

The Justice adjourned the case for three months and said that if, during that period, the parents had not disabused the boy's mind of his idea as to a break in the school week, the maximum fine would be imposed on them.

BUTTER SUPPLY

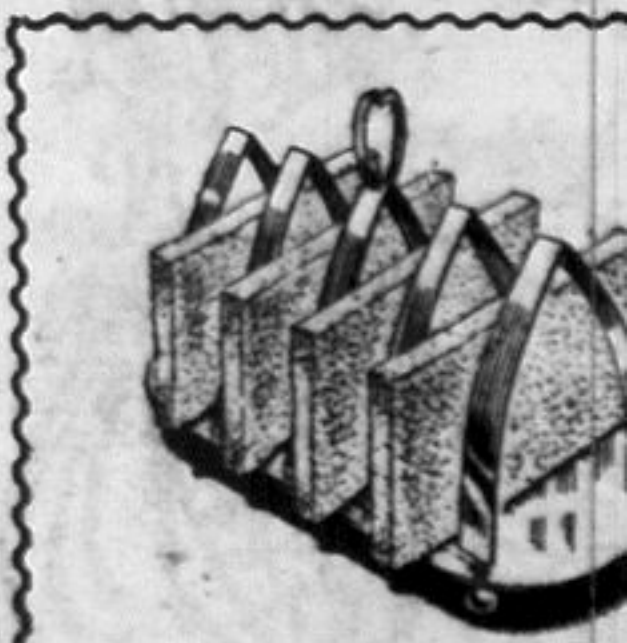
