**Mr. Michael MacMahon,
Ballyshonick**

The immense cortege which followed the remains of the late Michael MacMahon, Ballyshonick, Pallaskenry, to his last resting place at Castletown, bore striking evidence of his widespread popularity. His death at such an early age created a great sensation in the locality and the sincere sympathy extended to his wife and young family bore striking testimony of their great loss. Part of his early education was received at Blackrock College and later at Copsewood, where he became a great favourite. He was vice-president of the past pupils' associations and always took a keen interest in their annual functions.

NEW COUNTY LIMERICK

LIME SCHEME

Higher Price Asked

ACTION OF COUNTY COMMITTEE

TENDERS for the supply of lime under the County Limerick Agriculture Committee's Lime Subsidy Scheme show a marked increase in price over last year.

When the Limerick Co. Committee of Agriculture, at its monthly meeting on Saturday, examined the six tenders received for lime supplies, Dr. H. J. Spain (acting as C.A.O. in the absence of Mr. M. Gleeson), said that a number of contractors who had sold the Committee burnt lime last year for 5/6 a barrel were now looking for 6/3.

On the proposition of Mr. M. O'Donnell, Co.C., seconded by Mr. J. Quaid, Co.C., it was decided to offer all the tenderers 5/6 a barrel.

The Acting C.A.O. said that the subsidy paid on lime last year was 3/- per barrel. He suggested that the Committee reduce this to 2/- so that a greater number of farmers would benefit by the lime scheme.

Mr. Quaid said he would be in favour of having the subsidy reduced to 2/6 a barrel.

Mr. J. J. McNamara, Co.C., said that if reducing the subsidy to 2/- meant an increase in the number of farmers who would benefit, he thought the Committee should be unanimously in favour of the reduction.

C.A.O.—There is no doubt at all that more farmers would benefit if the subsidy were reduced.

Mr. McNamara—Then I propose that we reduce the subsidy to 2/-.

Mr. Quaid said that before the increase to 3/-, the Committee had paid for years a subsidy of 2/6 a barrel. He thought they should revert to that figure and not to the 2/- suggested by the Acting C.A.O.

Mr. McNamara said that a lot of ground limestone was now being used all over the county.

Mr. Quaid—In which case you will have a smaller number of farmers depending on burnt lime.

Mr. D. McAuliffe seconded Mr. Quaid's proposition that the subsidy to be paid by the Committee under the lime scheme should be 2/6 a barrel.

This was agreed to by the Committee without further discussion.
