Guard P. McKenna said that when he examined the car in a Limerick garage he found the brakes totally inoperative, with just a slight utility on the left wheel. Since then the defendant had got the brakes completely fixed.

Mr. Casey said his client didn't contradict the fact that he had no money. The car, however, was not fixed and he wasn't aware the brakes were in such a state of defectiveness. The Justice fined the defendant a sum of £5 10s., and gave him two months to pay.

Replying to Mr. Cussen, witness said he could say the same thing about the Wolfes. "I understand there was a bit of a difference between the parties previously in Pallaskenry."

### **CYCLING GROUP EIGHTEEN STRONG.**

Patrick Wolfe said, in evidence that when the Pallaskenry laundries cycled in a body into Askeaton that night he was walking quietly down the road with a friend. The Pallaskenry group was about eighteen strong. As they passed witness one of them shouted to the others to get off. They dismounted at Sheehy's butcher shop and as witness passed them, O'Neill asked for the best man in Askeaton.

"That was what started the disturbance," witness said. "Had O'Neill not come up to me and say that, I wouldn't have done anything."

Thomas Wolfe and Maurice Woulfe and Patrick McCarthy, first cousin of the Wolfes, gave corroborative evidence.

The Justice said there was not sufficient evidence to convict O'Neill, so Mr. Noonan needn't call him. He dismissed the charges against O'Neill, but bound the three Wolfes to the peace for twelve months in their own bonds of £100 each.
