

FELL INTO WELL

Adare Man Fatally Injured

VERDICT AT INQUEST

WHILE Mr. Sean Conway, aged 24, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Conway, Curraghbridge, Adare, was working at pump-sinking operations near Newcastle West on Monday evening he fell into a well forty feet deep and received injuries to which he succumbed in the County Hospital, Croom, shortly after admission.

INQUEST VERDICT.

At an inquest held in the County Hospital later by Dr. John P. Clery, Coroner for East Limerick, and a jury of which Mr. John O'Brien was foreman, a verdict was returned that death was due to multiple fracture of the skull, Dr. Lawler, who carried out a post mortem, having given evidence to that effect.

Sergt. Duffy, Croom, conducted the inquiry and the Coroner, foreman of the jury and Sergt. Duffy tendered sympathy to the relatives.

PROFOUND SYMPATHY AND REGRET

Profound sympathy was felt in Adare when the news of the tragic death of Sean Conway became known (writes our Adare correspondent).

Huge crowds lined the roads as the remains were removed from Croom Hospital to Holy Trinity Church, Adare. Members of the F.C.A. with their Pipers Band met the remains a mile outside the village and formed a guard of honour.

The funeral on the following day to Adare Cemetery was very largely representative of all classes and creeds, and again the F.C.A. formed a guard of honour and carried the remains from the Church, and to their last resting place.

VERY POPULAR IN THE DISTRICT

Deceased, who was very popular in the district, was a well-known musician and a member of the Adare Dramatic Club. Profound sympathy is extended to his bereaved parents and sisters.

Very Rev. Canon Dunworth, P.P., and Rev. Father Casey, D.D., C.C., officiated at the graveside.
