## BOY'S DEATH

### MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

Noel Ryan (22), Dooneen, Pat-  
rickswell, Co. Limerick, was, at  
Adare Court on Tuesday, before  
Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., charged  
with the manslaughter of Thomas  
Henry Foster (16), 60 Henry Street,  
Limerick, by, as alleged, knocking  
him down by a motor van at Bally-  
cummin, on the Limerick-Patrick-  
swell road, on the 26th November  
while he was cycling into Limerick.

Mr. M. M. Power, State Soli-  
citor, prosecuted, while Mr. D. J.  
O'Malley, solicitor, appeared for  
the accused.

Mr. Power told the Justice at the  
outset that it was his intention to  
have evidence taken from Sergeant  
Considine, Patrickswell, and the  
remainder of the witnesses could  
be dealt with at a later date.

The Justice said that there was  
no lighting system in the Court-  
house and, therefore, if he dealt  
with the case he might not be able  
to finish the evidence of the wit-  
ness that day. He thought it better  
to adjourn the taking of deposi-  
tions until Wednesday, 21st Decem-  
ber, at 11 a.m., when he could finish  
all the witnesses for the State on  
that date.

Accordingly, the case was ad-  
journed until next Wednesday.

The accused was allowed out on  
continuing bails.

### LIMERICK FOWL MARKET

There was a good supply of

## HAD NO LIGHTS

### JUSTICE TAKES SERIOUS VIEW

Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., took a  
very serious view at Adare Court  
on Tuesday of defendants sum-  
moned before him for using their  
motor vehicles at night without  
having the required lights on.

He imposed fines of 20/- in almost  
all cases, and he issued a warning  
that he would raise the fines in  
future to £2 each. He added that  
no one appeared to have any  
regard for lights at night, and it  
was especially the case in the Adare  
district — cyclists and motorists  
alike.

Supt. J. J. Cooney said that in  
the cases of many cyclists they had  
the lamps, but they did not light  
them.

each for not having the required

West; John Lillis, 9 Old Clare St.,  
Limerick; Joseph O'Connor, Behe-  
nagh, Knocknagoshel, Co. Kerry;  
Richard Moloney, Deerpark, Char-  
leville, and Patrick Moloney, Lisa-  
mote, Ballingarry, Co. Limerick.
