# BOY'S DEATH

### MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

Noel Ryan (22), Dooneen, Patrickswell, Co. Limerick, was, at Adare Court on Tuesday, before Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., charged with the manslaughter of Thomas Henry Foster (16), 60 Henry Street, Limerick, by, as alleged, knocking him down by a motor van at Ballycummin, on the Limerick-Patrickswell road, on the 26th November while he was cycling into Limerick.

Mr. M. M. Power, State Solicitor, prosecuted, while Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solicitor, appeared for

the accused.

Mr. Power told the Justice at the outset that it was his intention to have evidence taken from Sergeant Considine, Patrickswell, and the remainder of the witnesses could be dealt with at a later date.

The Justice said that there was no lighting system in the Courthouse and, therefore, if he dealt with the case he might not be able to finish the evidence of the witness that day. He thought it better to adjourn the taking of depositions until Wednesday, 21st December, at 11 a.m., when he could finish all the witnesses for the State on that date.

Accordingly, the case was journed until next Wednesday.

The accused was allowed out on continuing bails.

#### LIGHTS HAD NO

#### SERIOUS JUSTICE TAKES VIEW

Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., took a very serious view at Adare Court on Tuesday of defendants summoned before him for using their motor vehicles at night without having the required lights on.

He imposed fines of 20/- in almost all cases, and he issued a warning that he would raise the fines in future to £2 each. He added that no one appeared to have any regard for lights at night, and it was especially the case in the Adare district -- cyclists and motorists alike.

Supt. J. J. Cooney said that in the cases of many cyclists they had the lamps, but they did not light them.
