CO. LIMERICK JOCKEY'S CAREER

Mr. Jack Moloney, the 50 year old National Hunt jockey, who is shortly to set up as a trainer at Prestbury, near Cheltenham, is a native of Bruff (writes our Bruff correspondent). He has had an adventurous career, having had ten Grand National rides, and although the blue riband of the steeplechase has eluded him, his mounts have finished second on three occasions. His first mount in the Aintree 'Chase was on "Grakle," which was second favourite, in 1927. When this horse was successful four years later, Moloney finished second on "Gregalach." In his teens Moloney rode against the great F. B. Rees. His greatest hard luck story was on "Easter Hero" in the 1929 "National." With 12st. 7lbs. on his back "Easter Hero" was going like a winner approaching the end, when he had the misfortune to spread a plate. Thus handicapped, the best he could do was to finish a gallant second.
