COMPETED IN GOOD COMPANY FORMER PROMINENT CYCLIST PASSES

The death took place at St. Patrick's Nursing Home, Limerick, of Mr. Patrick O'Donnell, Dromin, Kilmallock, after a very brief illness (writes our Bruff correspondent). Deceased, who was very popular and well-known over a wide area, was son of the late Mr. Thomas O'Donnell, of Bulgaden, and belonged to a most esteemed farming family. He was a well-known cyclist in his young days, and competed against such famous cyclists as the late "Jim" Condon and the Thompsons of Mallow. He took a keen interest in politics and was an active member of the Fine Gael Party since its foundation. The remains were removed to St. Munchin's Church, Limerick, and the funeral took place after Office and High Mass to the family burial ground at Hospital, where the remains were interred in the presence of a large and most representative congregation.
