**LIMERICK COUNTY BOARD**

At a meeting of Limerick Co. Board, N.A. and C.A.I., held recently, it was decided to congratulate the newly formed sports federation on its efforts to have unity in athletics and all forms of sport not at present recognised internationally.

**CROSS-COUNTRY.**

A meeting of the County Board will be held at the Railway Hotel, Limerick, to-morrow (Saturday) night, at 8 o'clock, with a view to changing the venue for the novice cross-country championship and to make arrangements for the youths' (under 18) cross-country championship, etc.

Entries from all colleges and schools, as well as from individuals, should be sent to the county secretary as soon as possible. Teams consist of six members and not more than twelve.

Entries for novice championship (no age limit) should be sent in by club secretaries, together with 5/- fee per team, immediately. No entry accepted on field.

Cross-country runners attached to a club having no cross-country team may run with the nearest club to their residence.

The youths' championship will probably include entries from Copsewood, Christian Brothers (City and County), Mungret, St. Munchin's, Crescent, Murroe, etc.

It is hinted that a very popular citizen is presenting a cup for the youths' cross-country championship.
