GREAT VICTORIES.

Many thought Castletown were capable of stopping the "Drom" victory march, but the locals disposed of this obstacle in surprisingly easy fashion and their victories over Patrickswell and Cappamore in semi-final and final respectively are so recent that they do not need comment.

It was the first time that a county junior title ever came to the parish, though on two occasions they went as far as the last obstacle. Three or four years back Dromcollogher failed before Mungret, and in the early thirties Broadford just went under to Bohermore. In the intervening period Dromcollogher won two county minor hurling titles.

PROSPECTS IN SENIOR RANKS.

This year for the first time Dromcollogher enter senior ranks, and notwithstanding the dismal records of promoted juniors in the past, they are full of hope and confidence. They have every reason to feel hopeful, as they have strung together a first-class fifteen, and if the same spirit of enthusiasm and loyalty prevails during the present season, they should prove a match for most, if not all, of the senior teams in the county.

PROMINENT FIGURE

LATE MR. T. C. CARROLL, P.C.

The death of Mr. Thomas C. Carroll, P.C., one of Limerick's most prominent citizens, which occurred at his residence, "St. Rita's," Ennis Road, on Monday, has evoked feelings of deep regret and sorrow.

The late Mr. Carroll, until his health began to fail, took a very active interest in the building up of the trade and commerce of the city. One of the founders of the Limerick Development Association, he was its first Chairman and it was largely through his activities that shopping carnival weeks were held in the city over twenty years ago. A special feature of these carnivals was the holding of window dressing competitions, and in this connection it should be recalled that the judges, all strangers to Limerick, always paid very high tributes to those responsible for these artistic displays. The deceased was also a member of the Limerick Ratepayers' Society, but for some years past he was unable, because of reasons of health, to take an active part in the affairs of this body. In his younger days he was a noted amateur photographer and in the dapping season he was certain to be found amongst a group of enthusiastic anglers on Lough Derg.

He was the founder of the general stationery firm of T. C. Carroll and Sons, 122, O'Connell Street, which continued to flourish under his guidance and direction.

Of a very quiet and unassuming disposition, the late Mr. Carroll did not seek popularity; yet there were few amongst us who enjoyed a wider measure of public esteem and respect than he.

To his widow, sons and daughters deep sympathy is tendered in their bereavement.

The funeral, which took place to-day from St. Munchin's Church, following Requiem Mass at 10.30 o'clock, to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, was fully representative of the citizens in general.
