HOUSING SCHEMES

TENDERS ACCEPTED

Subject to sanction (writes our Ennis correspondent), the tender of Mr. P. C. McMahon, Ennis, has been accepted by County Manager Dr. Blackwell for the erection of 26 houses, including development work at Sixmilebridge, for the sum of £31,805, with rock excavation at 37.6 per cubic yard, and concrete roads. Fourteen of the proposed homes are to be one-storey, with an average area of 682 square feet, and twelve two-storey of 800 square feet. In each case the accommodation will include kitchen, three bedrooms, bath, w.c. and scullery.

For the old type of rural cottages tenders have been accepted from Mr. Joseph Ward, Kilclaran, Feakle, Co. Clare, at £649 per cottage, and from Mr. Thomas Linnane, Main St., Killenora, at £657 per house. The pre-war cost of these houses, which are one-storey, with a kitchen and three bedrooms, averaged about £250 each.

One of the aims of the clinics is to remove the stigma from mental illnesses. If we are to continue hiding away the location of treatment in holes and corners, we will never get away from that mentality and our progress in combating mental illness will be very slow.


