## INDEFINITE STANDSTILL?

### B. & I. SAILINGS DISPUTE

Our Dublin correspondent wires  
this evening that unless there  
is a settlement of the dispute by  
Wednesday, the entire British-Irish  
Steampacket Company's passenger  
and cargo services will be brought  
to an indefinite standstill.

To-day, our correspondent says,  
the crew of the "Innisfallen" at  
Cork joined the other strikers and  
it was announced that the vessel  
would not sail for Fishguard.

The Company denied that notices  
had been handed in by the crew of  
the Innisfallen.

The cargo boat "Meath," which  
arrived in Liverpool from Dublin  
to-day, also became involved in  
the dispute. When the 24 hours  
notice given by the crew expires,  
the vessel will remain at Liverpool.

The crew of the "Ulster Mon-  
arch," which reached Liverpool  
yesterday from Belfast, were  
said to have arranged for the serv-  
ing of notice, to expire at noon to-  
morrow.
