## PASSED AWAY

### DEATH OF MR. JAMES ANGLEY

The death of Mr. James Angley, St. Joseph's Place, Limerick, which took place in St. John's Hospital yesterday, has occasioned the deepest regret and sorrow.

The late Mr. Angley, a native of Kilmore, Co. Clare, began his career in Limerick as a member of the clerical staff in one of the city's leading industrial concerns. In the course of time he became attached to other firms and in later years he was employed in the Labour Exchange. He was a staunch adherent to the cause of Sinn Fein and when the Fianna Fail organisation was founded in 1927 he joined its ranks. He was elected a member of Limerick Corporation on the Fianna Fail ticket, but in 1934, when the membership of the Borough Council was reduced from 40 to 15 under the terms of the City Management Act, he failed to secure re-election. He was regarded as an expert on Proportional Representation and at times of elections his services were always at the disposal of the organisation to which he had given his allegiance.

The deceased was held in high regard and esteem and deep sympathy is tendered to his widow, family and relatives in their bereavement.

The funeral took place to-day from St. Michael's Church, following Requiem Mass, to the family burial ground at Bridgetown, Co. Clare. The cortege was fully representative of all sections of the community.

#### VOTE OF SYMPATHY

At a meeting of Limerick Vocational Education Committee, held last night, Mr. P. J. Donnellan, B.C., Chairman, presiding.

Ald. Hartney proposed a vote of sympathy with the widow and family of the late Mr. James Angley and said that the deceased was a sterling Irishman. He was a member of the Vocational Committee for many years and in that capacity had given many proofs of his interest in vocational education.

The Chairman (Mr. P. J. Donnellan), declaring the resolution passed, said that Mr. Angley was a very good friend. His widow and family had their heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement.

Many other members of the Committee paid warm tributes to the memory of the deceased.

## HARD LABOUR FOR TWO

A sentence of six months imprisonment with hard labour was imposed by Justice Kenny at Charleville Court on Thomas Kavanagh (24), stated to be a native of Kilmorrey, on a charge of having stolen from Ballyhea Parish Church on January 8th last a donation box containing about 10/-.

On a charge of receiving 5/- from Kavanagh, John McCarthy (17), a native of Skibbereen, was sent to hard labour for a month.

Garda evidence was given that Kavanagh, after being released from Cork Jail on Christmas Eve, stole a bicycle near Bandon, and cycled back to Cork and sold the bicycle. He met McCarthy in Cork, and the two walked through Buttevant to the church where Kavanagh stole the donation box.

Both defendants had a number of previous convictions.
