AN APPRECIATION OF LATE RICHARD REDMOND, LISNAGRY

It is just a week since we were told of the death of Mr. Richard Redmond, of Drominboy, Lisnagry, and some of us can hardly realise the fact even yet. It is about seventeen years since he came amongst us, and, except whatever we heard or read about him in the boxing arena, he was practically a complete stranger. During his all too short stay amongst us he showed himself to be a gentleman of refinement and ability. Widely read, broadminded, a kindly good neighbour, he was admired and respected by all. Indeed, any whom I heard speak about him since his death, which was sudden and unexpected, did so in most appreciative terms. The late Mr. Redmond was a native of Kinnity, Tullamore, Offaly. A forbear of his was bishop of the diocese of Killaloe, prior to the present occupier, his lordship, Most Rev. Dr. M. Fogarty. Our late friend was very prominent and successful as a pugilist. In fact, he fought Primo Carnera for the championship of the world. I often wondered if that sphere fitted his disposition, as he was so mild of manner, but I suppose those who met him in the roped arena wouldn't agree. But agreeing that it matters not whether we won or lost but how we played the game, from what we know about him I believe our late friend played it according to the best traditions. He certainly played his part in this area in the best possible manner, and going left a void that will not be easily filled. I wish to tender to his widow, family and relatives my sincerest sympathy. done, particularly in the primary schools, was carried to its rightful development, then the number of minor and juvenile teams could be easily doubled or trebled.

Junior and senior clubs have a big responsibility in this direction and are failing in their duty towards the games if they neglect to enter teams in the lower grades. It may entail extra trouble, but the end surely will justify this, for it is on the juvenile and minor teams of to-day depend the future of our senior and junior sides of tomorrow. There is no short cut to championship titles, and looking over the records we find that the teams who have come to the top in the higher grades are those who shone in the minor and juvenile competitions some years previously. There may be one or two exceptions but generally this is the custom. Attention and consideration given to the younger players invariably brings the biggest results.

Sometimes I feel that this business of transferring players has much to do with clubs refusing to field out in the lower competitions. If they were prevented from having this easy method of filling blanks in their older teams then they would be forced to rear their own talent. Perhaps it would be a good thing to do away with transfers for a few seasons. Then, with survival depending on it, we would be sure to see many more clubs take the field in the minor and juvenile competitions.
