In Europe, Pallottine communities are to be found in Austria. Czechoslovakia, France, Germany, England, Ireland, Italy, Poland. Portugal, Spain and Switzerland. They are also in the U.S.A., Canada, Argentine, Brazil, Chile, Uruguay, Africa and Australia.

On the 22nd January, 1850, the Lord in whose vineyard Vincent had laboured, called his faithful servant to his reward.

After a life spent in prayer and penance, into which the miraculous entered in no small measure, Vincent died on the vigil of the feast of the Espousals of Mary and Joseph, as the church-bells of Rome were ringing for vespers.

BODY INTACT.

His body was exhumed in 1910 and found to be intact. It was again exhumed about a month ago, and still intact, it is exposed to the faithful under the High Altar of the church of San Salvatore in Onda, where he spent the most irday, 21st of January, fruitful years of his life.
