**TALK TO PILGRIMS.**  
 rday, 21st of January,  
 Degrees of Doctor of Divinity and  
 Doctor of Philosophy, was appointed  
 Professor of Theology in the Roman  
 University.  
 His fame for sanctity soon spread  
 abroad, and Vincent was sought  
 both by rich and poor as confessor  
 and spiritual director. He was  
 confessor in many of the great  
 Roman colleges. He was intimately  
 connected with the Irish College,  
 where he was Spiritual Director.  
 He intended to found a foreign  
 missionary college in Ireland, but  
 was prevented by the great famine  
 of 1847-48.

**HIS ONE DESIRE.**

His one desire was to spend him-  
 self for the spread and propaga-  
 tion of the Catholic faith. To do  
 this, he founded the Society of the  
 Catholic Apostolate. The Aposto-  
 late was divided in three parts.  
 First came the central or directing  
 body, who were secular priests,  
 living in community, and imitating  
 the religious life. They did not  
 have the three vows customary to  
 religious, but were incorporated  
 into the Society by a solemn  
 promise of perseverance, i.e., a  
 promise to remain in and work for  
 the Society. These priests are now-  
 days known as Pallottine Fathers.

Then came the Spiritual Co-  
 operators who, by their prayers,  
 forward the ends of the Society;  
 and lastly, the Material Co-ope-  
 rators, namely, those who, by their  
 works, help to make God known  
 and loved by their fellow men.

**BIG GROWTH.**

To-day, his little Society has  
 grown to 3,353 priests and brothers.  
 Pallottine sisters number 2,904,  
 whilst there are 200,000 co-ope-  
 rators.

In Europe, Pallottine communi-  
 ties are to be found in Austria,  
 Czechoslovakia, France, Germany,  
 England, Ireland, Italy, Poland,  
 Portugal, Spain and Switzerland.  
 They are also in the U.S.A., Can-  
 ada, Argentine, Brazil, Chile, Uru-  
 guay, Africa and Australia.

On the 22nd January, 1850, the  
 Lord in whose vineyard Vincent  
 had laboured, called his faithful  
 servant to his reward.

After a life spent in prayer and  
 penance, into which the miracu-  
 lous entered in no small measure,  
 Vincent died on the vigil of the  
 feast of the Espousals of Mary and  
 Joseph, as the church-bells of  
 Rome were ringing for vespers.

**BODY INTACT.**

His body was exhumed in 1910  
 and found to be intact. It was  
 again exhumed about a month ago,  
 and still intact, it is exposed to the  
 faithful under the High Altar of  
 the church of San Salvatore in  
 Onda, where he spent the most  
 fruitful years of his life.
