RICK I.N.T.O. LOSS TO DIOCESE SENT FOR TRIAL Manslaughter Charge

FATAL ROAD ACCIDENT

NOEL RYAN, Dooneen, Patricks-well, was returned for trial to the April Sittings of Limerick Circuit Court by Justice Kenny at Ballyneety District Court yesterday.

Ryan is charged with unlawfully killing Thomas Henry Foster (16) on the night of November 26th last, by striking him with a motor van, the property of Lord Harrington.

Depositions in the case, taken at Adare and Ballyneety, allege that on the day mentioned, Ryan, without the owner's permission, and without having a driver's licence, drove Lord Harrington's converted ambulance from Dooneen to Limerick and back, and that on the way home he knocked down Foster, who had been cycling, and killed him.

Mr. M. M. Power, State Solicitor, is prosecuting, and Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solr., is defending. At Ballyneety yesterday the evidence of the last State witness

was taken. Guard Eugene McKenna, Patrickswell, said that on November 26th
last, at 8.20 in the evening, he
interviewed Ryan. Asked if he had
driven the blue van of Lord Harrington that day, accused replied:
"Yes. I was driving the van."
Accused also said he never had a
driving licence. He denied having
met with an accident that evening.
