## BRAN SUPPLIES LIMERICK MAN IN OBITUARY

### REQUEST FROM COUNTY COMMITTEE

On the proposition of Mr. D. McAuliffe, Co.C., Limerick Co. Committee of Agriculture on Saturday asked the Minister for Commerce to see that supplies of Industry and Commerce to see that supplies of bran were made available immediately to farmers.

Mr. McAuliffe said now that farmers were troubled by calving cows and other such seasonal problems there should be plenty of bran available. But in Newcastle West and the other parts of West Limerick with which he was intimately acquainted there was not a stone of bran to be had. He thought the Minister should see to it that farmers were enabled to get adequate supplies of bran during the entire spring.

Mr. T. O'Connell seconded and Mr. McAuliffe's motion was adopted unanimously.

Dear Sir—Permit me through your popular newspaper to bring to the notice of the public and to the departments responsible the serious disappointment and worry caused to farmers through lack of bran at this time of the year. Gone are the days when a farmer could buy a cwt. of bran or pollard as he needed it, but as time marches on it seems that those commodities are on the move too. Perhaps they have entered into a coalition, and are dished out to us under some strange name, but I'd prefer to get them separately and do the mixing myself. I would then know what I was buying.

Despite the fact that (as reported in the Press) Mr. Dillon says 30 per cent. of the bran produced is being reserved for sale to feeders through the usual retail channels, I find I can't get one stone of bran.

Bran is an essential food for a sow before and after farrowing and also for a cow after calving, and I think that pig breeders and dairy farmers should get their share. —Yours faithfully,
