## DEATH OF NUN OVER FIFTY YEARS IN RELIGION

On Monday, 20th instant, at the Presentation Convent, Limerick, Sister Veronica McMahon passed to her reward. She was beloved in life and deeply regretted in death by the community, to whose interests she unselfishly devoted her energy and her time during her long life of more than fifty years in religion.

Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in the Convent chapel for the repose of her soul on Wednesday, 22nd inst., and the interment took place in the Convent cemetery immediately afterwards.

## SHOP BREAKING

### SIX MONTHS FOR YOUTH

To-day, at the Limerick District Court, a youth named Owen O'Keefe, 94 Hyde Road, Prospect,

He applied to have James Lonergan (17) Doon South, bound to the peace. He said Lonergan was one of a group of youths who recently kicked up a row outside the Mercy Convent in Doon to the annoyance and pain of an old sister recovering from a serious illness within.

Lonergan, who was not professionally represented, admitted having offended in the way complained of by the Inspector.

### CARBIDE EXPLOSIONS.

Garda Brennan said that at nearly eleven o'clock on the night of January 3rd last he heard a number of explosions near the Convent. He thought at first they were revolver shots. Running to the scene, he found a group of boys cat-calling and crying. The defendant, among them, was making explosions with carbide compressed in a tin. They ran away and he gave chase. But they ran so fast that he had to borrow a bicycle and cycle hard to catch up on them. Two of the boys admitted having been involved in the noise-making. Lonergan refused to make a statement.

William J. Ryan said he and Denis O'Connor had been with the defendant outside the Convent. Lonergan had caused the explosions by enclosing carbide in an old canister and setting a match to it. The lid popped off and the compressed gas from the dampened carbide made the explosions.

### "A BIT OF SPORT."

After telling the Justice that he had nothing to say, Lonergan said, in reply to a further question, that he had no intention of annoying the Sisters. "We were just having a bit of sport," he qualified.

Sergt. McKenna, Doon, said the nuns were subject to considerable annoyance from groups of youngsters such as Lonergan.

The Justice said that in view of the background, he would bind Lonergan to the peace for a year in his own bond of £10 and two sureties of £5 each.

### ACCUMULATOR

### CLEANING FO

Use a wooden skewer to remove whatever silver polish is using for cleaning the prongs of the forks. It soon wears sufficiently to be used evenly and will not scratch the face.

### BRIGHTER ALU

To remove discoloration from aluminium, add cold water and a spoonful of vinegar; for half an hour, then wash and dry at once.

### WASHING LINEN

During the course of cleaning operations, wash curtains come in for a great deal of attention. If you are doing the job of the wash, wash blinds, do it this way:—Lay down, lay flat on the floor, scrub well with a hard brush using powdered bath soap. It will remove all dirt and leave blinds a wonderfully bright appearance.

### UNPLEASANT S

To prevent the smell of cooking from accompanying the cooking of vegetables, add half a glassful of vinegar to the water in the pan, and there will be no smell during the cooking.

### PASTRY-MAK

One of the secrets of successful pastry-making is to use the ingredients as cold as possible. If the ingredients are warm, dip them in cold water before handling the dough. It should be rolled out on a slab in preference to a board.

### PEARL NECKL

Pearl necklaces have come back into fashion, so roll them long and knotted at the ends, others in a choker around the throat. The best way of keeping them shining is to clean with a solution of magnesia. Put the necklaces in a tin of magnesia so that they are covered with the powder for about 12 hours. Then brush the powder off with a brush.

### DO YOU KNOW

That tar stains on clothing are quite easily removed with a paste of powdered magnesia and turpentine? Spread the paste over the stains and let it dry before washing.
