### EMIGRATED 52 YEARS AGO

The death took place recently in the United States of Mr. John J. Shaughnessy, a native of Askeaton, Co. Limerick. A New York paper has the following obituary:-

"John J. Shaughnessy, 84, of 125 Harding Place, died on February 21st, 1950, in his home after a two-month illness.

Mr. Shaughnessy was born in Askeaton, County Limerick, Ireland, in December 19th, 1865, a son of the late John and Catherine Sullivan Shaughnessy. He came to this country and to Utica when he was 21 years old.

"Mr. Shaughnessy was a foreman in the McLoughlin Cap Factory for 40 years and retired in 1932. married Miss Mollie McCabe here in July 5th, 1911, in St. Francis de Sales Church, of which he was a member.
