**DEATH OF MR. W. F. MCDONNELL**

A prominent figure passed away last week in the person of Mr. William F. McDonnell, Neptune House, Park Road, Waterford. The deceased, who was born in City House, Roxboro' Road, Limerick, in November, 1871, was managing director of Messrs. W. and C. McDonnell's margarine factory until his retirement in 1945. A model employer, who enjoyed the confidence and respect of all with whom his business brought him into contact, he formerly resided at Ballinacurra, Limerick, and went to Waterford in 1913 when his late father transferred the margarine factory to that city from Limerick. Mr. McDonnell was, in his early years, a keen golfer and rider to hounds, and a noted badminton, cricket and billiards player.

The funeral, which was private, took place to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, Limerick, on Saturday last, 25th inst.

**POINTS OF THE PLAY.**

From the kick out Rockwell again attacked, but did not seem capable of scoring. Nearing half time Crescent had a second opportunity of scoring when Cross was just wide with a grand penalty kick.

**HAIR BREADTH ESCAPES.**

Rockwell lost no time in taking up the offensive in the second half. From the kick out they hammered away at the Crescent line. McInerney was the first to go near scoring, being taken by O'Keeffe at the corner flag. The latter was again conspicuous when beating two forwards for the touch-down. From here on hair-breadth escapes were so numerous that one almost lost track of them. Bernard, O'Keeffe and Foster were in turn stopped when all but over. They were eventually rewarded when Kiely slipped over to score near the corner flag. Moore failed with the convert.
