THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK. WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET. Incalf Heifer Sold for 57 Gns.

Tuesday, April 18th—The numerical register of entries was heavier than last week, numbering 115, with more cows than heifers; class about up to the standard of last market, and included some drafts of choice, promising and nicely bred dairy heifers. Owing to the unfavourable weather conditions a number of buyers are holding back from purchasing; all the same the attendance was quite satisfactory, and all present were anxious to purchase. Well bred, choice and promising heifers were wanted and readily bid for, and made full current rates, plenty of customers wanting this class; dairy proprietors are willing to give top rates and full values for the right stamp of dairy heifer; anything with pretensions to milking qualities, whether with size or the nice cosy medium sized heifers, were quickly taken up; while the choice, high-grade heifers created sharp competition; secondary heifers and those in poor condition did not appeal to buyers. Choice and promising dairy cows met a steady trade, plenty of buyers for this class, and well bred cows of the right type showing udder capacity and fitness found favour, and no difficulty in exchange; secondary cows and those lacking dairy qualifications met a quiet trade; this class did not appeal to buyers. Over the day there was a steady demand for the right sort of heifer or cow, prices working out on the basis of recent quotations. Mr. Patrick Buckley, Louriga, Patrickswell, gained premier place for an exceptionally high-class roan heifer of true dairy type at 57 gns.; this price equalled the record made on April 4th last. The heifer was much admired and attracted spirited competition before the hammer fell to Mr. Denis R. Daly, Kilfrush, Knocklong. Top price for dairy cows went to Mr. Tony Kennedy,
