NUN'S DEATH

LOSS TO MERCY ORDER

The death took place to-day in St. Mary's Convent, Limerick, of Sister Mary Gertrude Kennedy, who had been a member of the Mercy Order for over 40 years. She was born at Herbertstown, Co. Limerick, 57 years ago and practically all her religious life was spent in Limerick. Though her labours for the Foreign Missions were unceasing, she devoted much time to helping the sick poor and the needy generally. Her death is a severe blow to her Community, to whom deep sympathy will be tendered in their bereavement.

The interment will take place in the Convent Grounds on Wednesday following Office and Requiem High Mass at 10.30 o'clock.

SNOW IN DUBLIN AND BRITAIN

According to the R.G.D.A.T.A. Review, the Department of Agriculture is preparing a scheme to prevent a shortage of eggs next winter. The idea is to hold in reserve a large supply of eggs and place them on the market at the first sign of a scarcity.

Tim Molony and his brother Martin, the champion steeplechase jockeys of England and Ireland, respectively, together with their mother, Mrs. Kate Molony, were guests at a dinner and dance held in Carass Court Hotel, Croom, last night.

The function, which was organised by the sporting fraternity of County Limerick, was attended by 200 drawn from all parts of Munster.

Very Rev. Edward Punch, P.P., Mungret, proposing the toast of the Molony family, spoke of the great honour the Molony brothers had brought to Limerick and to Ireland. Tim was champion National Hunt Jockey of England, while Martin was Irish champion and runner-up to his brother in England. That was a most unique distinction.

Father Punch alluded to the honoured place held by Limerick men in the various fields of sport, and said that County Limerick bred horses were famous the world over.

Other speakers were Mr. W. F. Power, Rathcannon; Mr. Tim Hyde, Irish trainer; Mr. J. J. McNamara, Co.C., and Mr. L. McNamara (Croom).

The brothers Molony, in brief speeches, thanked the company for the honour paid them and their mother, to whom, they said more than anyone else, they owe their success.

MOTOR RACE TRAGEDY

One driver was killed and at least ten others were injured, five seriously, in a series of crashes in the opening hours of the Italian Mille Miglia (1,000 mile) car race yesterday.

Aldo Bassi (Italy) was killed instantly when his Ferrari hurtled into a stone wall only 13 kilometers from the start of the race.

The race was won by Giannino Marzotto, one of Italy's four famous racing brothers, who covered the 1,050 miles course in 13 hours, 38 minutes and 20 seconds—an average speed of 76.5 miles an hour.
