In Lonely Bachelor's Last Trip

TEE A POIGNANT STORY

HE came over from the United States by air less than a fortnight ago with the intention of residing permanently in Ireland. To-day his mortal remains were interred in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, Limerick.

THE CENTRAL FIGURE.

The central figure of this poignant story was a lonely bachelor named Bernard Diamond, who was born in Armagh some 65 years ago. The son of a District Inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary, Diamond, as a young man, went to South Africa and joined the Army of the Union, from which he was in receipt of a pension. Later he went to the United States, entered business and in due time became a naturalised citizen.

Having saved a considerable sum of money, he decided to return to the homeland to spend the remainder of his days in familiar surroundings.

CAME BY AIR.

Travelling by air, he landed at the Shannon Airport and proceeded to Limerick. Contracting a chill, pneumonia developed and yesterday, fortified by the rites of the Catholic Church, he passed away in a city hospital.

Last evening the remains were removed to St. Munchin's Church and the interment took place to-day in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.

The American Consul in Cork, Mr. D. A. Lewis, having been informed of Mr. Diamond's death by the hospital authorities, came to Limerick yesterday and took charge of his personal affairs.

NO LIVING RELATIVES.

The deceased had no living relatives. It is believed that a sister, long since dead, was born in Galway.
