NEW INDUSTRY

CONCRETE PIPE MAKING IN LIMERICK

A new Limerick industry will begin deliveries of its products in six weeks time.

Last Friday, Limcrete, a private limited company, began production of porous concrete pipes at the rate of 3,000 a day. The pipes, made in different sizes, will be used in land drainage work under the Land Project. Later the Company will manufacture other such products of agricultural and industrial utility as concrete posts for fencing and cavity blocks for building.

HOPE TO SUPPLY THREE COUNTIES.

Mr. Paddy O'Dwyer, Auctioneer, Limerick, one of Limcrete's directors, told the "Limerick Leader" that the Company hoped to supply all of Counties Limerick, Tipperary and Clare with the pipes.

"Although we started last Friday," he said, "we won't be ready for deliveries for about six weeks. The pipes are being made at the moment at Nicholas Street by two machines suggested for the purpose by Departmental experts. We have already eight men employed in the factory. Later when we extend the range and volume of the business we hope to take on many more."

Mr. O'Dwyer thinks Limcrete's biggest customer will be the Department of Agriculture. "Some schemes of land reclamation are held up already for lack of the very type of pipe we are making," he said. "Of course, farmers who do the reclamation work on their own farms themselves will also want the product.

WAS WAR VICTIM

DEATH OF CO. LIMERICK

DOCTOR

The occupation of the Channel Islands by the Germans in 1940 is recalled by the death of Dr. John P. Moore, a native of Newcastle West, who passed away on Saturday at the County Infirmary, Limerick, after a prolonged illness. Deceased, who belonged to a well-known and esteemed West Limerick family, carried on a lucrative private medical practice in the Channel Islands up to the outbreak of the war. Some time after the occupation he succeeded in getting to England, where he underwent much hardship during the worst stages of the blitz. As a result of these experiences his health failed, and he returned to Ireland some eight years ago and spent most of the intervening years as an invalid in the Infirmary.

Aged about 68 years, the late Dr. Moore is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Bridget Flanagan, of Highmount Villa, Milford, Co. Cork. He was brother of Miss Bridget Moore, Bridge St., Newcastle West, and step-brother of Mr. Richard Moore, formerly of Dungeha, and now of Tipperary. Deceased was uncle of Dr. Eugene McEnery, M.O., Pallasgreen; Mrs. O'Driscoll, draper, Maiden St., Newcastle West, and of Mrs. C. Cregan, Tipperary. He was pre-deceased only three weeks before his demise by his brother, the late Mr. Maurice Moore, who returned to Ireland in 1946 after spending some 50 years in Chicago. Sincere sympathy will be tendered to the bereaved widow and relatives.

There was a large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place on Sunday from Newcastle West Parish Church to Churchtown Cemetery.
