

Those who revel in reminders and mementoes of the past will find much to interest them in the latest number of the North Munster Journal, just issued by the Thomond Archaeological Society. In this richly-illustrated publication pride of place is given to a lengthy contribution from Justice D. F. Gleeson, D.Litt., who writes very illuminatingly of the origins of our Irish topographical divisions under the title "Parish Bounds in the Killaloe Diocese." Rev. L. Taheny, O.P., St. Saviours, Limerick, deals with the history of Lorrha Dominican Priory, and gives a great deal of interesting information on that subject. "A Romanesque Head from Peter's Cell" is the title of an article by Mr. John Hunt, M.A., dealing with the founding of the Limerick Cathedral by King Donal Mor O'Brien in 1176 and giving historical details of the periods before and after this. Mr. S. Stewart and Mr. R. Herbert have collaborated to produce an interesting account of some Georgian houses of Limerick and Clare. In this they give much information regarding a number of well known local residences of renown. Rev. Dr. R. Wyse-Jackson, D.Litt., contributes two articles—"Some Church Silver of Limerick City" and "The Walls of Cashel," dealing with both in the able manner always expected from such a master of archaeological subjects. Mr. J. N. A. Wallace deals briefly but in a very interesting way with "A Limerick Silver Tankard," this being an account of a well-preserved silver tankard weighing 28.3 ozs. and made by a Limerick goldsmith, Robert Smith, in 1687. Reviews and some other items complete a journal that merits a very wide circulation. The annual subscription to the Thomond Archaeological Society is 10/- and this sum entitles members to free issue of the Society's journals and free admission to all lectures and excursions.
