

FEAST OF ST. JOSEPH

O'Neill, presided at Solemn High Mass at 12 o'clock, at which the Celebrant was Rev. M. O'Donnell, C.C.; Deacon, Rev. E. O'Dea, C.C.; and sub-Deacon, Rev. C. O'Neill, C.S.Sp. The Master of Ceremonies was Rev. R. O'Sullivan, C.C., and in the sanctuary with the Lord Bishop was Very Rev. J. White, Adm.

A panegyric on St. Joseph was delivered by Rev. Seán Magner, C.S.S.R.; while the singing of the Mass was rendered by the choir under the conductorship of Mrs. N. Penny, Organist.
