BEET SEED

REPLY TO RECENT STATEMENT

(To the Editor, "Limerick Leader.")

Dear Sir—I have read, with interest and dissatisfaction, a statement made by Patrick Lillis, a member of the Limerick Committee of Agriculture, and published in the "Limerick Leader" of April 29th, 1950. During a discussion on the price of milk my friend Pat accused Mr. James Dillon, Minister for Agriculture, of throwing a spanner into the works of the beet seed machinery. As chairman of the Beet Seed Growers of the "Outer Circle," I feel it my duty to contradict this statement. As a member of the deputation that called on Major-General Costello in Mallow last November, I can say without fear of contradiction the general manager told us that a statement made by a member of the Beet Seed Committee at a meeting in Limerick and published in the "Limerick Leader" was the cause of all the trouble. The member spoke of the poor quality of the seed. The Spanish Government read this article and saw the statement mentioned. They there and then cancelled any contracts which they had intended to sign with the Irish Sugar Company. This, Major-General Costello told us, was one of the reasons for the reduction of the beet seed acreage. Later, in Croom, at a public meeting, the General Manager confirmed this statement and told us that the cost of producing beet seed was 300 per
