INQUEST AT RATHKEALE

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Throat

The body was discovered by Gardai who had been searching for deceased since Saturday last. He had been reported missing on Saturday morning.

An inquest was held in Rathkeale Courthouse on Wednesday evening by Mr. M. E. Qussen Coroner and a jury.

Evidence of identification was given by deceased's father, who said his son hald been missed from his home on Friday night.

Dr. B. O'Donfell, Rathkeale, said he examined the body, post mortem, and found that death was due to shock and haemforrhage caused by throat wounds

Articles Taken From For Three Countries Flat

BOUND OVER WOMAN

THE taking of articles from a flat 1 at 9 Rutland Street, Limerick, had a sequel in the Limerick District Court to-day, before Justice D. F. Gleeson, when Mrs. Teresa Cox Pennywell, of 41 was charged that between 7th and 14th April she did unlawfully and relonously break and enter the dwellinghouse of Mrs. Bridget Kelly with intent to commit a felony. She was also charged with the larceny of an alarm clock, value fl 5s.; a frock, value fl; a pair of sheets, value f1 15s.; two pieces of cloth, value 10/-; and a sum of money, £1 2s. 6d., all the property of Mrs. Bridget Kelly.

Inspector Griffin prosecuted, while Mr. E. Treacy, solr., defended, and said that his client was pleading not guilty to the charge of breaking and entering, and she was pleading guilty to the larceny of the articles with the exception of the cash amounting to f1 2s. 6d.
