

FOUND DEAD

With Wounds On Throat

INQUEST AT RATHKEALE

MICHAEL WALSH, aged 20, of Scart, Rathkeale, was found dead on Wednesday morning in a field half a mile from his home. The only injuries on the body were throat wounds.

The body was discovered by Gardai who had been searching for deceased since Saturday last. He had been reported missing on Saturday morning.

An inquest was held in Rathkeale Courthouse on Wednesday evening by Mr. M. E. Cussen, Coroner, and a jury.

Evidence of identification was given by deceased's father, who said his son had been missed from his home on Friday night.

Dr. E. O'Donnell, Rathkeale, said he examined the body post mortem, and found that death was due to shock and haemorrhage caused by throat wounds.

The jury's verdict was death from shock and haemorrhage caused by throat wounds, self inflicted.

Both Coroner and jury expressed sympathy with the deceased's family.

STRIKE OVER

END OF C.I.E. DISPUTE

The unofficial railway strike, which began in Limerick at midnight on Saturday last, came to an end yesterday, and to-day train services were more or less normal throughout the country.

Following an all-day meeting between the leaders of the three Railway Unions and officials of C.I.E., a mass meeting of the men at Inchicore last night decided by a majority vote to accept proposals which the Unions had brought from the Company, and to resume work immediately.

Delegates from the other centres affected—Cork, Limerick, Athlone, Galway and Sligo, as well as Grand Canal Street and Broadstone—were present at the meeting of the men, and they also accepted the Company's approach to the matters in dispute.

The decision was immediately telephoned to the provincial depots, and the men there were instructed to report for duty. Goods trains

LARCENY CHARGE

Articles Taken From Flat

WOMAN BOUND OVER

THE taking of articles from a flat at 9 Rutland Street, Limerick, had a sequel in the Limerick District Court to-day, before Justice D. F. Gleeson, when Mrs. Teresa Cox (26), of 41 Pennywell, was charged that between 7th and 14th April she did unlawfully and feloniously break and enter the dwellinghouse of Mrs. Bridget Kelly with intent to commit a felony. She was also charged with the larceny of an alarm clock, value £1 5s.; a frock, value £1; a pair of sheets, value £1 15s.; two pieces of cloth, value 10/-; and a sum of money, £1 2s. 6d., all the property of Mrs. Bridget Kelly.

Inspector Griffin prosecuted, while Mr. E. Treacy, solr., defended, and said that his client was pleading not guilty to the charge of breaking and entering, and she was pleading guilty to the larceny of the articles with the exception of the cash amounting to £1 2s. 6d.

Mrs. Bridget Kelly said she lived in a flat at 9 Rutland Street, where she carried on the business of dress-making. She remembered the 7th April when she locked her flat and went to England. She sent back the key of her house to her son to open it and get papers which were there.

MISSED ARTICLES.

The witness, continuing, said she came back from England on the 25th April and went into her room, where she missed certain articles (as set out in the charge). She also missed the sum of money, which was collected from dockets which she gave out for clothes, etc., and she had put the money into a vase on the sideboard. She also saw a lot of candle grease around the floor, but she did not use any candles.

Mr. Treacy: How long were you away? I was away from the 7th and it was on the 25th that I came back.

Continuing in cross-examination, witness said that there was no one in charge of the premises and they were locked with a padlock. She knew the accused since she was a baby and she also knew her mother, who were also good payers to her. The vase in question was always standing on the sideboard.

Justice: Was there other property which could have been taken? Yes, there was.
