**LIMERICK TEAM WINS
CHIEF EVENT**

THE First Aid and Ambulance
Test competitions, held in
Limerick at the Municipal Techni-
cal Institute by the Order of St.
John of Jerusalem and Malta on
last Sunday, were an outstanding
success.

Teams were entered from Ennis,
Tramore, Killarney, Nenagh, Wat-
erford, Kenmare and Limerick.
The standard was very high and
the examining doctors were very
impressed by the efficiency of the
various teams. The Lecture Hall
was decorated for the occasion, and
the Tricolour, the Papal flag and
the flag of the Order of St. John of
Jerusalem were displayed.

OBITUARY

Mr. James E. Nix

Mr. James E. Nix, Meelick,
Limerick, who died recently at an
advanced age, was a brother of the
late Rev. Wm. Nix, who died on the
American Mission (writes an
esteemed correspondent). He was a
first cousin of the late Robert Nix,
Stonepark House, who took a case
before the British House of Lords
in respect of land flooding and won.
There were two previous appeals
in Dublin, and the law costs ran
into thousands of pounds. The G.S.
and W. Railway Co. were the de-
fendants. Deceased was a son
of Robert Nix, Boola, who defeated
the famous Ned Grady, casting the
hammer at the Newcastle races—
then the Limerick venue. The race-
course was later changed to Ballina-
curra and from that again to Green-
park, about half a century ago.

Ned Grady was a famous athlete
in the Ireland of his day, about a
century ago, and his defeat created
a sensation and nearly caused a
great fight between the followers of
both parties. Those who saw "Bob"
Nix in action said he was nearly
as broad as he was tall but that
Grady was much the taller man.

It is of some interest to note that
Canon White, in his History of Co.
Clare, states that a James Nix
owned a great tract of land in
Meelick and Coonagh. A Captain
Nix fought at the siege of Limerick
in 1690. He married Miss Rachel
MacCutcheon, who came of an im-
portant city family there.

ENNIS TWO-DAY FAIR

At Ennis two-day May Fair there was
a very slow and disappointing trade in
cattle, attributed to the absence of
buyers owing to the effects of the re-
cent transport dislocation and to the
shortage of grass. The best milch cows
were £40 to £45; springing heifers, £35
to £40; 3 year-olds, £35 to £42; 2 year-
olds, £26 to £28; yearlings, £18 to
£23. Best fat sheep fetched £8 to
£10; fat lambs, £5; ewes with lambs,
£10 to £13; first quality hoggets, £8
to £9 10s. At the horse fair there was
a large supply, but mainly of poor
quality. A few class horses of the
hunting type went from £52 to £75;
strong working horses, £30 to £40; two
year olds, £25 to £35; cobs, £25 to
£37 10s. Horses for slaughter sold at
£10 to £15.

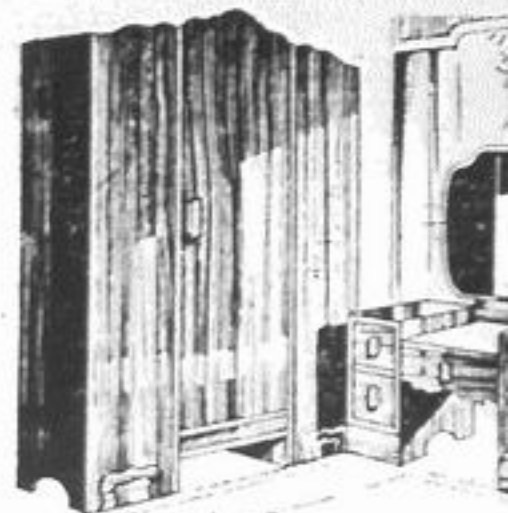
