**Mr. James Brady**

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Mr. James Brady, 32 Bishop Street, Limerick. The deceased was a shoemaker by trade, and for almost half a century carried out a most successful business at 24 Nicholas Street. The late Mr. Brady came from a family long associated with the Island Parish of St. Mary's, and was an exemplary Catholic. Although of a retiring disposition, he was deservedly popular with all classes, and more especially with those with whom he was intimately associated. His death at St. John's Hospital, on the 8th of this month, after an illness of about six weeks is deeply regretted not only by his sorrowing wife and family, but also by the residents of the district where he spent all his life.

**Death Of Mr. Martin Foley**

With very deep regret we announce the death of a highly esteemed citizen in the person of Mr. Martin Foley, who passed away in the early hours of Tuesday morning at his residence, 3 St. Joseph's Terrace, Limerick. The deceased had been in very indifferent health for the past few years but was out and about as usual on Sunday last. On Monday, however, he took seriously ill and passed peacefully away early next morning. The late Mr. Foley was engaged extensively in a proprietary way in the fruit and confectionery business and had a very large clientele over a wide area of the country. An exceedingly kind, good-hearted and genial figure, he enjoyed the full confidence and respect of all who knew him. He possessed traits of character and a degree of sociability that had won for him golden opinions everywhere he went, and the large measure of genuine popularity he enjoyed was due to his many great attributes of natural merit. To his bereaved widow, sons and daughter and his brothers and sisters and other relatives we extend our very sincere sympathy on their sorrow.

The remains were removed on Tuesday evening to St. Michael's Church, where Requiem High Mass was sung next morning, after which the funeral took place to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.
