CHANGE FOR BANKS

It is learned that the Standing
Committee of the Banks, following
negotiations with the Bank Officials'
Union, have agreed to the Saturday
half-holiday for Limerick instead of
Thursday. The date fixed for the
coming into force of the new
arrangement is Saturday, 1st July.
In addition to Limerick, seventeen
other towns, including Nenagh,
Roscrea and Cloughjordan, are to
be given the Saturday half-holiday
and it would seem to be only a

becomes general.
