Newport's Big Day

OPENING CEREMONY NEXT SUNDAY

ON next Sunday, May 21st (writes our Newport correspondent), the official opening of the Paddy Ryan ("Lacken") Memorial Park will take place at Newport. This field was purchased some years ago by the Newport G.A.A. Club, who kindly handed it over to the Old I.R.A. for the purpose of dedicating it to the memory of the late Paddy Ryan ("Lacken"), a well-known I.R.A. leader. The opening ceremony will be performed by Dr. Andy Cooney, Dublin.

The local Gaels deserve to be congratulated on their having acquired such a beautiful sports-field. They have left no stone unturned in their efforts to make this playing pitch equal to the most prominent Gaelic fields in the country.

BIG PROGRAMME

During the week hundreds of voluntary workers were engaged in perfecting the arrangements for Sunday's big programme, which will include a parade to the field of the Old I.R.A. and other bodies, headed by several bands from Limerick City and County, and from County Tipperary. Prior to the monster hurling tournament, to be played between Limerick and Tipperary, Dr. A. Cooney will deliver an oration and unveil the "Lacken" Memorial. After the big game a ceilidhe will be held in the Parochial Hall.

The Memorial Committee have had under consideration the question of official invitations to the unveiling ceremony on Sunday, with particular reference to the fighting comrades of the late Mr. Paddy Ryan ("Lacken"), the active service units of Tipperary and Limerick and of Cumann na mBan.
