NATIVE OF CAPPAGH

Mr. John F. Cregan, a native of Cappagh, Co. Limerick, died unexpectedly at his home, 14 Riverside, Hornell, New York, recently. Aged 65, he emigrated to the United States at the age of 20. An obituary notice in an American paper says:

"He was born in Ireland and resided in Hornell for about 45 years. He retired as Divisional Car Superintendent of the Erie Railways last September.
