LAST MANDEVILLE PASSES

AWAY

The private funeral of Mr. Frank Mandeville took place at Kilbehenny Cemetery recently (writes our Ballylanders correspondent). The deceased gentleman died at Carrickon-Suir and was the last of the patriotic Mandeville family Mitchelstown, who gave all they had in promotion and defence of the Plan of Campaign. Most readers who know Mitchelstown will readily remember the beautiful statute of John Mandeville erected in the spacious square. The late John Mandeville was incarcerated Tullamore Jail in 1887, and his magnificent physique succumbed to the horrors and indignities inflicted on patriot there, and shortly release he after his died July 8th, 1888. A beautiful towering Celtic Cross was erected then in Kilbehenny by the Irish people, and carved on that Cross is the Felon's Cap. broken sword and captive chains.
