SUPPLEMENTARY BULL SALE AT LIMERICK CATTLE MARKET

This important annual fixture was conducted by Mr. Louis de Courcy, auctioneer, on the 16th inst. The entry, which totalled 52 head, showed a substantial increase on last year's entry. The quality all round, both yearlings and two year olds, was much higher than at last year's corresponding sale. Buyers were in good attendance and transactions in most cases were readily recorded under the hammer. The fall in prices, as compared with the exceptionally high rates, which ruled at the annual sale, was not as great as had been anticipated. The turnover and clearance were easily a record for this supplementary sale.
