DEATH OF MR. J. HARTNETT,

NEWCASTLE WEST

The death occurred on Tuesday of Mr. Joseph Hartnett, Lower Maiden Street, Newcastle West, member of a family which had been prominently associated with the business life of the town for more than half a century. Deceased, who had been in failing health for some years, was son of the late Thomas Hartnett, founder of the widely known cycle business and garage, in which he carried on a flourishing trade for many years. Widely popular and esteemed, the late Mr. Hartnett enjoyed the respect of all sections, and his death, although not unexpected, has occasioned widespread regret. Sincere sympathy will be tendered to the bereaved widow and family, as well as to the other relatives. There was a large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place to Churchtown Cemetery on Wednesday.

THE LIEUTENANT SOFT.

"Holding" going—if it materialise — will be in fact Bold Lieutenant, Bogstown and Kilmorna Captain. It is evident that the trio will on the mark should the going be on the soft side. On form it looks as if "Lieutenant," Maddest Daughter and Darland will be primed and concerned with the first three. It has been argued that Maddest Daughter did not reveal her true form when going under to Bold Lieutenant, though she was at the top form when accounting for Bold Lieutenant. On this score it seems as if Darland must win, the other hand, form does not run out at all times accurately.

DARLAND GETS FIRST C

Knowing also that Darland paced Oleander twice — the latter easily beat Drimmeen this season — would tend to tip the scale in favour of Darland.

In summing up, it looks as if the main issue will be a three-way struggle between Maddest Daughter, Bold Lieutenant and Darland. If Bold Lieutenant wins by the first bend in the field then he should win. Darland need to be drawn inside Bold Lieutenant to possess a strong chance. As he is fast to find his feet, saying is, and expecting to challenge Bold Lieutenant at the first and second bend, it is given to Darland. If he manages to pass Bold Lieutenant then Maddest Daughter should step up to take second honours before the fancy is: Darland, Maddest Daughter, 2; Bold Lieutenant, 3.
