### LIMERICK CATTLE MARKET WEEKLY FAT STOCK MARKET TUESDAY, JUNE 27.

The entry showed a decrease in both departments. Buyers were in fairly good attendance, but were definitely taking matters easy, with the result that prices have slipped back in their favour. This in particular applies to the sheep section, where the price of fat sheep has fallen anything up to £1 per head as compared with prices obtaining three or four weeks back.
