## FOUGHT IN I.R.A.

## And Later Joined Guards

## LATE SERGEANT MICHAEL

## RYAN

THE death of Sergeant Michael Ryan, Garda Siochana, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ryan, Knockatana, Cahircorish, has created widespread regret (writes Mr. David T. Dwan, Redgate, Limerick). His father, who was a member of Limerick County Council for over twenty years, understood the value of education and had his son sent to Munster College, Limerick, and later to St. Patrick's College, Thurles.

Like other young men of his day, when the country called he did not hesitate, but at once joined the East Limerick Brigade, I.R.A., giving of his best in the fight against the notorious Black-and-Tans. When the fight was over he decided to become a member of the new police force—the Garda Siochana—and his fine physique and education made him a very acceptable member.

He served first in Cork City. From there he went to Bandon, then to Donegal, and in 1926 was transferred to Ballinagh, Cavan, where he remained until death called him. During the late World War he organised the L.D.F. (now F.C.A.I.) and the Red Cross, and kept both in a high state of efficiency, ready for any emergency. Though a hurler himself, having played with the famous Caherline team, he became an enthusiastic follower of football, rejoicing with the men of Cavan when the team brought All-Ireland honours to the county.

As a Garda officer, the late Sergt. Michael Ryan was most efficient, as testified to by the number of times he was complimented in public court by the District Justice and the Circuit Court Judge for his thoroughness and ability in the handling of cases. He was concerned in what was, perhaps, the strangest case a member of the Garda Siochana had ever to deal with—a stolen horse which was found, after much searching, in the bedroom of the thief's house.

When his remains were being removed to the church and later at the funeral there was much evidence of his popularity. The Gardai and public attended in large numbers. Chief Superintendent Macken, Monaghan, was in charge of the Guard of Honour, and Superintendent Murray, Cavan (who spoke highly of him), and Inspector Gillette were also present. All the local school children, marshalled by five teachers, accompanied the funeral through the village.

The Cavan people, supposed to be somewhat cold, are actually the most warm-hearted people in the country when the occasion calls. There was ample evidence of this in the number of residents—merchants, teachers, Gardai and others—who came with the funeral all the way from Ballinagh to Cahercweeney.

Inspector Pender, Limerick, was in charge of the guard of honour at Cahercweeney, where there was a big attendance of the general public.

Father Ryan, P.P., Glin (cousin), officiated at the graveside. Deceased is survived by his widow, one son and four daughters. Many telegrams of sympathy were received by his widow and also by his brothers and sisters: Mr. Tom Ryan, Knockatana; Garda John Ryan, Mrs. J. H. Ryan, Wickham Street; Mrs. Burns, wife of Garda Burns, Limerick; Mrs. Redmond Burke, Cahircorish, and Mrs. P. Brennan, Ballyloughanash, Herbertstown.
