## A FAMOUS RELIC SWORD THAT BEHEADED ST. PAUL

Firemen are searching the wells of the Convent of the Sisters of St. Jerome in Toledo, Spain, for the sword with which St. Paul was beheaded (says "The Tidings," quoted by the Catholic Library Information Bureau in Dublin). The relic, which had been preserved in the Convent since it was brought from Rome in the 14th century, was thrown into one of the wells to save it from seizure by the Communists during the Spanish Civil War. The nuns have documentary evidence of the authenticity of the relic, which carried the emblems of the Roman Emperors.

## ALL-IRELAND PIPE BAND CONTESTS

Arrangements for this year's All-Ireland Pipe Band Championships in Lansdowne Rd. Football Ground, Dublin, on August 5th, are now being completed. There will be contests for bands in four grades, with challenge cups for piping and drumming in each, and a total prize fund of £100. For solo championships there will be two contests, with trophies and medals. The solo contests are being held for the first time and the interest in them already ensures a development in standards. Bands from all provinces will compete this year. A special train from Belfast will again bring a large contingent from Ulster.
